If I look at the physical age of my life, I may become depressed or just sit around in the rocking chair of life doing nothing. However, I do not believe that age should hinder us from doing those things that would give glory to our Father.

Aging is a beautiful part of living. It is about building relationships, planting seeds in the younger generation and being creative – yes, even at our age. I have a plan . . . a plan of being a world changer in this new season of my life. I can do this by exploring new ideas, networking in areas of interest, being willing to get out of the boat on the opposite side I've been hanging on to for many years – in other words, trying new things and being willing to change.

You can start by attending a Friendship Bridge meeting and making new friends or by bringing a friend with you. Maybe it will be someone you just met or a neighbor you've never met or just because you want to try something different.

OPERATION JUMPSTART (Homeless Community Outreach Program)

Volunteer Spotlight By David Gonzalez

When I was asked to talk about myself and my story, I felt very nervous to share my story with others. I did not want people to look at me differently once they found out



exactly what life was like before Christ, citylife church and University Community Ministries' Operation Jumpstart (OJ) Homeless Outreach Program.

I should start by mentioning that I was raised in the Catholic Church and I didn't really enjoy it too much. It was just me and my mom until I was 12 when she met her now ex-husband. I was pretty much sheltered until he convinced her it was good for me to go outside and hang out with my friends and enjoy my young life. What people didn't know was that once I hit the streets, I fell in love with them. I started smoking and selling weed when I was 14 and started running with the wrong crowd. I skipped more days of high school than I attended but still managed to graduate. I only graduated so my mom could see me walk across the stage; it meant nothing to me since I was living so hood rich.

After high school, I stepped into the big leagues of drug dealing when I started selling heroin and by the age of 19 I had a car with \$15,000 worth of work done to it and around \$40,000 to \$50,000 in my bank account. I was living the fast life and enjoying every minute of it. It all came to a halt when I got robbed of over \$10,000 worth of heroin.

I was connected with the Latin Kings and that's where I was getting my drugs from. They would give me the drugs and I would sell them then pay them their money after I sold it. It's what they call a "front" in the streets.

After I got robbed, I had to tell them what happened. They spared my life because I never made a mistake before. However, they did beat me until I couldn't get up from the ground without assistance. My connection with them ended after that. I started selling weed again because that's what I knew. I also continued stealing from stores and robbing people at gun point to make extra money, living with no fear of getting caught or being sent to prison.

I got arrested on my mother's birthday for trying to steal a present for her and it was then that I promised I would never steal from a store or anything like that again. That, however, did not stop me from selling drugs and robbing other drug dealers. What did make me stop was the love of a beautiful woman that I still love till this day, but I messed up and now her heart belongs to someone else, which brings me to how I found citylife church.

After I broke up with the love of my life, I started selling cocaine because I was in a bar every night and I figured I could make some money and always have cocaine when I wanted it. I became very addicted to the drug and stopped turning a profit and made just enough money to be able to continue to get more products.

I eventually found myself broke, homeless and in the streets living motel to motel staying afloat by making drug deals on the side or gambling my last \$20 to hopefully make a flip and pay for my motel room. I got so tired of being broke, hungry and high all the time that I decided I needed to change. I jumped on the bus and went to citylife church. I didn't tell anyone what I was doing. I went by myself and sat in the back row. I had no one. My family didn't want anything to do with me and I felt lonely. I even felt lonely at church because when I got there, my whole row was empty. But after the service and crying my eyes out, I felt refreshed.

I called my mom and begged for forgiveness and told her about this amazing place I found and I got her to come with me and now we go every Sunday and Wednesday together. I wanted to start my own nonprofit to help people like me and that is how I made contact with UCM's Homeless Outreach Program called Operation Jumpstart (OJ). Since that day, I have been a proud member of the UCM OJ Program as well as the youngest and most handsome I should add. That's my story in a nutshell. Thank you for the chance to tell it.
